The Special Districts Association of Monterey County (SDAMC) met in person on July 18, 2023 with Director Verbanec and the General Manager attending.

The speaker at the meeting was Monterey County Sheriff Tina Nieto and a fact sheet on the Sheriff's office is attached. She is the first Latina Sheriff in the history of California. She was sworn in on December 30th and almost immediately had to respond to flooding on the Salinas, Carmel and Pajaro Rivers as a result of the multiple atmospheric rivers that impacted Monterey in January. She addressed issues at the Monterey County Jail and the related Hernandez legal settlement requiring specific actions that limit the discretion on the use of personnel for other purposes. It appears no one was previously held accountable including consultants at the jail. She reported on a 9 hour standoff in Salinas after a deputy was shot. An after incident review focused on revising procedures used for serving eviction notices. She is working to improve coordination with surrounding law enforcement agencies and is a member of the state policy commission that is referenced on the attachment.

Vince Ferrante, California Special District Association (CSDA) Director representing the Coastal Network, reported the annual CSDA conference will be held this year in Monterey. He reported assisting the efforts to create a special district association in Santa Cruz county and that our local Senator John Laird was recognized by CSDA as the California Legislator of the Year.

Kate McKenna, Executive Director of the Monterey County Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO), reported the current litigation with the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District (MPWMD) is expected to move to hearings in early August. The city of Gonzales is applying for a 50 acre annexation on the south side for a commercial cooler plant. Governance issues between the city of Greenfield and three small special districts will be considered at the September LAFCO meeting. Alternate public member commissioner Steven Snodgrass has resigned from LAFCO and is relocating out of state.

Mary Ann Leffel reported the Monterey Regional Airport is holding a public meeting on July 27th to review the proposed \$60 million terminal building upgrade, 91% paid by Federal funding sources.

The next SDA meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 17, 2023 at 6:00 pm at the Bayonet and Black Horse Golf Course Clubhouse in Seaside.

Monterey County Sheriff's Office was established in 1850 and is one of the oldest Sheriff's Office in California. William Roach was the first Monterey County Sheriff from 1850-1853. Sheriff Tina Nieto is the 32nd Sheriff. The Sheriff's Office employees roughly 300 sworn personal and about 160 civilian staff.

The Sheriff's Office is comprised of three divisions:

The California Peace Officers Standards and Training (POST), services over 600 law enforcement agencies that includes 85,000 peace officers and 8,500 public safety dispatchers.

POST History and Mission

POST was signed into law by Governor Pat Brown in 1959. Since then POST has been the leader in setting statewide professional selection and training standards for California law enforcement. In fact, POST became the model for the rest of the nation to follow. Almost every state now has a similar agency commonly referred to as "POST".

Our mission is to continually enhance the professionalism of California law enforcement in serving its communities. We do that by being responsible for a remarkable range of programshere's a partial list:
